





LAC admission rate has been largely maintained









Children's Social Care in Bolton

- Early Help and Complex Families Hub to improve management of step up/step down
- Working across GM on ASU model to reduce LAC
- Emerging transition strategy for young people with complex needs who will require adult social care
- Improved joint commissioning with partners in health, CCG, adult social care
- Increased capacity of IRO team
- Active involvement of staff in development of MASSS, audit programmes and practice week
- Comprehensive suite of management and performance intelligence reports tailored to various audiences.
